

"The Bata Shoe Museum is North America's only museum dedicated to exploring the history and cultural significance of footwear. Drawing from a world-renowned collection of nearly 15,000 shoes and shoerelated objects, join Elizabeth Semmelhack, Director and Senior Curator, for a fascinating journey through some of the most significant artifacts from the collection."

As Director and Senior Curator at the Bata Shoe Museum, Elizabeth applies her extensive cultural art history background to guiding the museum mission forward and exploring the multiple roles and meanings of footwear through innovative and engaging exhibitions.

With over 20 exhibitions curated, Semmelhack's most recent exhibition is In Bloom: Flowers and Footwear (2024). Other exhibitions Semmelhack has curated include: Obsessed: How Shoes Became Objects of Desire(2023); Future Now: Virtual Sneakers to Cutting-Edge Kicks (2022); All Dolled Up: Fashioning Cultural Expectations (2021); The Great Divide: Footwear in the Age of Enlightenment (2020); WANT: Desire, Design and Depression Era Footwear (2019); Standing Tall: The Curious History of Men in Heels (2015); Fashion Victims: The Pleasures and Perils of Dress in the 19th Century (2014); Out of the Box: The Rise of Sneaker Culture (2013); Roger Vivier: Process to Perfection (2012); On a Pedestal: From Renaissance Chopines to Baroque Heels (2009); Beauty, Identity, Pride: Native North American Footwear (2007), and more.

Out of the Box: The Rise of Sneaker Culture (2013) was expanded into a blockbuster travelling exhibition in partnership with the American Federation of the Arts and was displayed in several US venues, and travelled across the US and to Australia in 2015 - 2017.

Named by FASHION Magazine as one of the world's top five gamechanging fashion curators, Semmelhack has been featured in articles and interviews in National Geographic, Vogue, Elle, InStyle, W Magazine, Women's Wear Daily, Wall Street Journal, Forbes Magazine, The New Yorker Magazine, GQ Magazine, L'Offciel, Washington

She has also appeared on numerous television and radio programmes including NBC's *Today Show* and the *Conan O'Brien Show*; and in documentaries including *Unbanned: The Legend of Air Jordan I.* (2018), *The History of Cool.* MSNBC (2018); *Abstract: The Art of Design. Tinker Hatfield* episode. Netflix (2017) and *God Save My Shoes.* (2011)

With a growing international collection of nearly 15,000 shoes and related artifacts, the Bata Shoe Museum showcases 4,500 years of footwear history in four distinctive rotating galleries. Through the creation of its innovative exhibitions, the BSM strives to enlighten and entertain visitors of all ages. For every shoe there's a story!







The October 2023 RTOERO National Fall Forum By Regan Heffernan



I attended my first RTOERO National Fall Forum as the Second Corporate Member from District 15 Halton. I was on a team with **Jerry Powidajko**, **Brad Fisher**, and **Penny Hambly**. It was an excellent well-planned event. The whole experience enriched me and made me more committed to my involvement with RTO

On a personal level I enjoyed meeting with Martha Foster, our CEO. She and I are from the same village near Niagara Falls and she attended a very small high school with my sister. That personal interaction with Martha enriched my time at this conference which was a pleasant social time filled with good learning.

The major decision confronting this conference was to decide whether or not members with the benefit package needed to continue to pay for our membership. The motion would exclude members who do not pay for our benefits and they would need to continue to pay for their membership. The clarification that came at the conference showed that our benefit payment includes a remittance of over two percent to RTO. Under the motion all members will now contribute approximately the same amount to RTO to fund the organization. Those with insurance pay through a percentage remittance and those who do not have benefits with RTO pay through direct membership fees. The consensus on the floor was that this plan made all members relatively equal and still ensured the long term health of the RTO operations. While this was the significant decision of this conference, I was interested in all I could learn about RTOERO.

I always try to distill my opinions on an issue down to a thesis that I can express clearly and quickly. I attended the Forum with a particular question in mind. What is the main difference between our organization and other benefit providers? While there are other in-

surance providers, our organization protects us very well and serves us through commitment to us as we age. A portion of our benefit payment to RTO funds and supports an organization that leads important work on behalf of seniors' wellbeing. It also provides an opportunity for fellowship and community engagement. Significant social activities and speaker series are held locally to bring members together for learning and for social interactions. I left the conference proud to be part of an organization that serves my interest and the interest of my colleagues. Covid taught us that the healthcare and social care programs in society fail seniors more often than other sectors of society. RTO is a group of well connected seniors supporting seniors. We have a credible voice which we use to influence positive changes. We work for the benefit of seniors in general and our members in particular. As we continue this work, it will be important to engage new members

Our name tags identified our role at the conference because only Corporate Members can vote on motions. We also had a number of ribbons that could be added to the name tag to identify our experience. I was the only first time attendee that I met during our forum. I saw many people who were attending their tenth forum. I came away confirmed in my commitment to the organization. While I am certain that we still value that involvement, I hope now that we can work passionately to make the future brighter for seniors. Personally, I hope to shape the world in which I want to live by supporting greater outcomes for seniors!

Health Benefits Committee Report By Bonnie Cummings

I hope everyone had a great holiday season full of delicious food and lots of family visits. I always look forward to the holidays to spend time with my family and friends.



Our "Know Your Health Plan Workshop" on October 2, 2023 offered in collaboration with District 13, was very successful. Stephen Wong's presentation was very informative. The feedback from our members was very positive. We will try to do this workshop again next year. We had 31 members from our District attend this year's event. A good time was enjoyed by all. The food was amazing!

I will highlight a few key areas for those who could not attend. Stephen started his presentation by explaining the importance of having insurance and how RTOERO operates. Of importance to remember is that RTOERO is a not-for-profit organization, so the premiums are set to cover the cost of claims, not to generate a profit. If excess premium is collected, the entire amount is fully reinvested back to members. All plan change suggestions submitted by members are collected for review the following year. At the Fall Benefits Committee meeting, the committee prepares the renewal for the following year for approval by the Board.

RTOERO's partners are Johnson Consultant, Partial Risk Underwriter, Johnson Administrator Claims, CloudMD, Canadian Pharmacy, and Global RSA Travel.

Stephen went over the new Digital Member Portal and reminded everyone that starting Jan. 1, 2023, the RTOERO policy requires that you submit your claims within six months from the date the expense was incurred. He reminded everyone that it is helpful to share your e-

mail address with them, your Power of Attorney (photocopy is okay), and Spousal Authorization (I authorize my spouse to ask questions on my behalf). Always include your name and phone number on your correspondences.

Extended Health Care highlights were discussed and examples given. Of importance, if you are over 65, each August you pay a \$100 deductible to ODB (Ontario Drug Benefit). It's important to tell your pharmacist that they must put your prescriptions through ODB first, then through Johnson. The government does not cover all medications so it's important to have insurance. Express Scripts can save you money and it is worth looking into for your maintenance prescriptions.

New in 2023 is Kii (by CloudMD). It is available at no extra charge for EHC (Extended Health Coverage) participants, their children (regardless of age), parents, and parents-in-law. You work with a nurse care coordinator who gathers your medical information for review and sends it to the most appropriate specialist. They have an extensive network of physicians and specialists who will review your diagnosis. Your nurse care coordinator will work with you throughout the entire journey ensuring you understand your diagnosis, care plan, and next steps.

The importance of travel insurance was reviewed and travel highlights were given. Some reminders of what is included in the EHC plan, at no additional cost: 93 days coverage per trip, 100% of eligible expenses up to \$10,000,000 per person/trip, \$6,000 for trip for cancellation/interruption/delay. Travel questions? Call Johnson at 1-877-406-9007.

Supplemental travel insurance can be purchased. You can purchase up to 212 days with the same EHC 93 day plan insurer, with no medical questionnaire. Coverage automatically renews unless you cancel it. If you are returning home instead of purchasing extended insur-

ance, remember that you must return to your province of residence. There is a new stability period and you need new proof of departure. Emergency medical coverage is available if you contract COVID 19 while travelling (subject to pre-existing medical conditions exclusion). Medical Stability is considered 90 days stable. Change in Medication Exceptions: a reduction or discontinuation in medication due to an improvement in your medical condition, the routine adjustment of Coumadin, Warfarin, insulin, or oral medication to control diabetes, a change from a brand medication to a generic medication (provided that the dosage is not modified).

Proof of travel documents can be an airline ticket, boarding pass, passport stamp or credit card receipts - gas, hotel, duty free - from Ontario.

Travel Tips to consider: Download the 2023 Insurance Plans Booklet from RTOERO's website, Carry your Benefits (ID) card when travelling, in the event of a claim, call Global Excel as soon as possible. (Know how to dial out from a foreign country).

Dental Highlights were reviewed from page 31-37 of the booklet. Basic and Preventive, Minor Restorative and Major Restorative and 2022 updates were reviewed.

Hospital & Convalescent Care was reviewed: Semi-Private Room Coverage 95% with no maximum; Convalescent Care 80% reimbursement up to \$75 per day.

cancellation/interruption. As of September 2023 you have a new option to top up your existing trip cancellation and interruption coverage. With the RTOERO travel insurance included with your extended health care plan, you're covered up to \$6,000 per person, per trip for cancellation or interruption expenses. You can now add extra coverage as follows:

- Buy the extra trip cancellation/interruption insurance for a specific trip to have coverage of up to \$12,000 per insured for that specific trip.
- Choose single, couple or family coverage.
- Read the Entente Insurance Program booklet for full details, as coverage is subject to the same terms and conditions as the trip cancellation/interruption in the RTOERO travel plan.

You have coverage for up to 93 days per person, per trip through your extended health care plan. If you're travelling for longer than 93 days outside your province or territory of residence, you can easily add coverage for extra days as follows:

- Add five more days of coverage for a trip of up to 98 days, or extend your coverage in 15-day blocks.
- Staying longer? Extend coverage while you're already on vacation.
- Premiums are added to your regular monthly payment and deducted in equal monthly installments.



Archives Committee Report

An Appeal from the Archives!

It is surprising to me that there are so few records and documents from the early years of District 15. The district was formed in 1973, in partnership with Peel. In 1987 we became a district on our own. The earliest record we have of attempts to communicate with retired

teachers is in 1992 when the president of the day, **John Bingham**, started a newsletter that he called, "NO NAME NEWSLETTER".

The first recorded issue of the newsletter that we have is from the fall of that year, 1992, and is listed as Vol. 1 No. 3 but the next issue in Spring 1993 was also labelled No. 3. There must have been a Vol. 1, No. 1 representing the inaugural issue of the newsletter dating from spring of 1992. We would love to get our hands on that initial issue. If anyone knows of its whereabouts, please let us know.

This message, to our District 15 members, is a general appeal for any documents, photos, or mementos from the 1970s to the 1990s. We are also missing some board minutes from those years. We would be so grateful to include them in the archives or make copies, if that is the donor's wish.

And, what of that second publication in 1992. What were the main concerns for retired teachers? It is no surprise that health, travel insurance and pensions were reported on at length. It was noted that Blue Cross had increased its premium significantly and "we in STO/ERO are indeed fortunate in having such a caring organization seeing to the well-being of its members and keeping our premiums and coverage within reasonable limits."

Another interesting item in the publication was that the fall Board meeting incorporated the Fall Luncheon and featured a talk by Ray Lowes, the founder of the Bruce Trail. The meeting began at 10 a.m. and concluded at 3 p.m. The cost for members was \$18 but only \$15, if you retired before 1982!

Political Advocacy Committee Report

Thanks to **Moira Plexman** for attending the Zoom meeting on my behalf for the RTOERO Political Advocacy group while I was out of town. Moira kept notes and shared the initiatives we have in Halton with the other team members from other districts.

The topics of interest in Halton are;

- 1. Lobbying the governments, both federal and provincial to create:
- a) a Seniors Ministry to address issues with Long Term Care (LTC) facilities and scrutinize conduct, care and costs. b) a Pharmacare system, dental care, housing, homelessness for seniors. c) a Seniors advocate to navigate issues for us. This is not a political issue. It's a healthcare and senior wellness issue demonstrating our humanity.
- 2. LTCs in Halton. Who owns and operates them? What is their reputation for care? We have members who visit and have voiced concerns about care and costs for services in LTC's. As well, Homecare is challenging because of the inconsistency of care and lack of staff.
- 3. We need to know the financial dealings of the province. How much does it cost for an hour of care? Is that consistent across facilities? The Ontario government has mandated 3.5 hours of care for each person. How is that monitored? Who is entitled to care?
- 4. Organizations we work with to learn more about advocacy issues include the Advancement of Women Halton; University Women's Club; Grandmother's Voice (Indigenous Women's Circle); Women of Halton Action Movement; SAVIS; Halton Women's Center; GASP-Grandmothers Act to Save the Planet; and the Ontario Health Coalition. Report on LTC and legislation in Ontario.
- 5. Halton held an Environmental Awareness Event with Bob MacDonald of the CBC radio show *Quirks and Quarks*. Bob talked extensively about the positive aspects of environmental change referencing his book, *The Future is Now!* and gave a thoughtful take on initiatives to

A fall National 50-50 lottery was conducted to raise funds for the **October Social Isolation Campaign**. \$62,000

was raised of which half went to the grand prize winner. You just need one ticket to win! Why not consider buying a ticket at the next 50-50 draw?

Members and Districts are encouraged to make donations to support the development and creation of programs to reduce isolation among seniors. Again, this year District 15 Halton donated to this important cause. Funds raised are channeled into research, webinars, and special grant projects.

This year, 2023, **Hearing Life** partnered with the Foundation to match all donations up to \$5000 for **Giving Tuesday held on November 28**. Thank you, Hearing Life! District 15 participated by submitting a donation of \$1000 that then was matched for a total donation of \$2000.

The **Foundation granting program** wrapped up in December. The deadline to accept full proposals was November 1st and the final decision was made at the December board meeting. An announcement of the successful grantees will be made in January.

The **Cooking Up Calm** booklet, funded solely by the Foundation, was featured at this year's Canadian Association on Gerontology conference in Toronto last week. The research team from the University of Alberta presented their work, as well as the booklet, to conference attendees and received high praise. Travels to South Africa and Zimbabwe, January 2023 By Nancy Dickson

This area has been a part of the world I have long wished to visit and as January is considered "off season" and comfortably warm, my husband, Jim and I, took the opportunity to be part of a tour group of nine - seven Americans and us.



Our adventure started in the modern city of Sandton, which is a suburb of Johannesburg. It is a very modern, high-tech city where many corporate head offices have gathered. We toured Constitution Hill Court which was built on the footprint of one of the most nefarious prisons in the country. On the site is Con-

stitution Hall, erected after the end of apartheid in 1994, incorporating bricks from the demolished prison. In addition, the site has been con-

verted into a series of museums depicting the history of the country and the deplorable conditions of the men and women imprisoned there as late as the 1980s. It was said that only two out of every ten persons in prison were criminals. The rest were government protestors. This is one of the four cornerstone walls of the prison – left as a reminder!

For a driving tour through Soweto (South West Township) a guide joined us giving us a greater un-



derstanding of how government functioned and how people provided

for themselves here. A shortage of electricity is a huge problem in this country and the citizens blame the officials in con-

trol who have defrauded the country. The result is "load shedding" which means that for at least four hours of every day, electricity is turned off across the country. Imagine driving through major cities like Johannesburg with no traffic signals! But consider too, hospitals, schools, shops, businesses, and restaurants without power that length of time.

The next part of our journey was to Kruger National Park – one of many in the country but one of the largest. We spent two days within the park and covered a very small fraction but we saw a great deal of wildlife! I noted over 50 sightings of birds and animals in their natural habitat on the first day alone. The highlight was seeing the pride of lions – two males lying on the roadway, keeping watch over the females and cubs grazing nearby (*Photo on Inside Back Page*). Lions are one of the Big 5 - elephants, water buffaloes, hippopotamus, and cou-

gars. We saw all except the cougars, but saw so many others - baboons, impalas, giraffes, zebras....

From there we flew to the south coast - Knysna which is a resort area and the Knysna Lagoon where the Indian and Pacific Oceans meet. There, we dipped our toes in the water!





enjoyed lunch. We were introduced to South Africa's highly touted





And then we were off to Capetown on the west side and had a ride up the cable car to Table Mountain so named for its shape, followed by a bus trip out to the Cape of Good Hope and the most southern point in Africa, Cape Point.

For our last evening, we joined other tourists at a dinner club where we dined on a panoply of African dishes and experienced a drumming presentation. There was a drum of some sort on every chair in the room and we were instructed by the very talented entertainer

Just three of us extended our travels with a trip to Zimbabwe and Victoria Falls but so glad we did. Our hotel appeared to be a thatched roof cottage built into the trees.

Mosquito netting surrounding the bed made exiting it during the night challenging! The falls were majestic and no picture does them justice. (Photo on the front page.)




