



I have had the pleasure of showing some of my former friends around the island when they were in the harbour for the day. It is always refreshing to see the island from a new arrival's perspective."

Allan Joseph Fish January 31, 1904 – December 28, 2005



Recently, we lost a dear colleague and friend. Al was a long-time active member of RTO/ERO District 15 who graced us with his presence at our functions on a regular basis – the last time at our Fall Meeting on October 27, 2005 at the age of 101. The following is an edited version of the eulogy presented at Al's funeral by Gerry Droppo, one of our members.

Born in Otterville, Ontario into a family of five boys and two girls, all of whom were assigned chores, Al and his younger

brother, Fred, had the job of splitting wood for the stove. Apparently, Fred did the chopping and Al did the watching. When questioned by Fred, Al responded, "I'm watching and thinking, is there a simpler way of doing this?" Already Al was developing his supervisory skills.

Al worked at a number of jobs in his teens before entering the North Bay Normal School at the age of twenty. His first teaching job was in the Village of Hunta, then it was on to South Porcupine, then to Timmins and finally, in 1930, to Fort Francis where he became a Supervising Principal and Business Administrator for the Board. In 1953 Al joined the Oakville Board of Education where he held the same appointments.

During his tenure in Oakville Al was responsible for the establishment of an Oral French Program (the first in the province for all students K-Grade 8) the first Special Education class for students, Consultant Services for teachers and Psychiatric Programs for students. He retired from teaching as an Area Superintendent in 1969. In 1983 Al received a citation from Premier Davis commending him on his dedication and his distinguished career in education.

Al was active with the Rotary Club of Oakville and was a member for 51 years, still attending monthly dinner meetings before his hospitalization. He was presented with The Paul Harris Fellowship, Rotary's highest honour, in recognition of his contributions to the ideals of Rotary. However, Al would say that his greatest accomplishment was a marriage of 63 years to his wife Marty who passed away in 2000. (Al Fish... continues on Page 17)

When asked how he had made it to 100, Al replied, "I look in the mirror each morning and tell myself, I have a rainbow around my shoulders and it fits me like a glove, making me feel like a million dollars." He believed that one could do anything if one had enthusiasm — "the sparkle in your eyes, the swing in your gait, the grip of your hand, the irresistible surge of will and energy to execute your ideas." No wonder he was always smiling.

One of Al's favourite memorized quotes was from Lord Tennyson's Ulysses:

I am a part of all that I have met; Yet all experience is an arch wherethro' Gleams that untravell'd world, whose margin fades For ever and for ever when I move.

District 15 Constitution To Be Amended

Provincial RTO/ERO requires all districts to review their constitutions every 4-5 years. The District 15 Constitution Committee (Ray Smith, Chair and Peter Gnish) worked over the past year reviewing the existing local constitution. The Committee recommended a number of changes to reflect the evolving nature of our organization and to ensure that the document coincides with the Provincial Model Constitution. The first revised draft was reviewed by the District 15 Board in May, 2005, and forwarded to the Provincial Constitution Committee for review/comment. The response from the Province, received in November, 2005, gave general approval to the revised constitution and recommended some minor changes. These were all incorporated into the latest draft which was approved by the Board at its January 25, 2006, meeting.

The following is a summary of the major changes that are proposed for the constitution. RTO/ERO District 15 members present at the May 10, 2006, Annual General Meeting will vote on the final draft. A two-thirds majority of those present and voting at the AGM is required for approval.

A number of **Cosmetic Changes** were suggested (corrections to spelling, updating names of committees, minor rewording for clarification) that would not change the intent of an article. Several **Minor Changes** were suggested to conform to the Provincial RTO/ERO Model District Constitution. The **Major Changes** proposed are as follows:

- The Board has been expanded to include the Newsletter Editor and the Website Coordinator.
- The tasks of the Awards Committee have been clarified and a section has been added so that an award for a non-member who has provided significant service to District 15 can be given.
- The Social Committee will now be responsible for all aspects of the organization of the Fall and Spring meetings .
- The Communications Committee will now be responsible for writing and disseminating an e-letter to members who submit email addresses.
- The words "and active teachers" were added to bring a Political Action Committee article in line with the Provincial RTO/ERO policy.
- Banking and Finance is a totally new feature article that has been added at the request of the Provincial Constitution Committee to bring it in line with the Model Constitution.

At the May Senate a new scholarship program with a bugeted amount of \$25 000 was approved. RTO/ERO members with relatives who are attending or plan to attend an institution of higher learning to pursue a career in education will find this article of great interest.

- Consideration shall be given to gender, geographical distribution and language balance based on the proportion of applicants
- Scholarships shall be granted to children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews of RTO/ERO members
