





TRIBUTE TO WARREN MCBURNEY

The Board of District 15 Halton was saddened deeply to learn of the death of Warren McBurney in December, 2022.

Warren had been a long-serving member of our District 15 Goodwill Committee and his record of service was impeccable. Over the years, he diligently and enthusiastically sent birthday cards and thinking of you cards to our retired members in Oakville, as well as delivering flowers in person to those celebrating

very special birthdays. He would deliver poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter to those members 90 and over. At the AGM in 2013, Marina LLoyd presented him with a Distinguished Service Award.

In addition, Warren and his wife, June, were always supportive of the District 15 Social Committee outings, organized to attend local community theatre, especially at the Oakville Centre for the Performing Arts. As President of the Burl-Oak Theatre Group for several years, I waited in the lobby for Warren's review of our productions. He always succeeded in finding the finer points of the actors' performances, the creativity of the production teams, and the applied skills of the directors.

Warren grew up in Walkerton, ON. He earned a BA in English and Journalism from the University of Western Ontario and a B.Ed. from the University of Toronto. He had a rewarding 35 year career as a high school English teacher in Collingwood, then in Oakville at G.E. Perdue and White Oaks Secondary School.

Warren was a loving father, grandfather, and great-grandfather who was revered as a true gentleman by all he met. His hobbies included travelling, exploring almost every continent, photography, woodworking, reading, gardening, genealogy, and collecting both stamps and autographed books. The book, which began his collection of over 400 titles, The Fall of a Titan, is autographed by Igor Gouzenko! Agatha Christie's signature, as well as that of Lucy Maud Montgomery, appear in other books

In his long retirement, in addition to being our Goodwill representative in Oakville, Warren remained active in his community as a volunteer ESL teacher, a canvasser in his neighbourhood for health charities, and as a singer in his church choir.

William "Warren" McBurney passed away at University Gates Retirement Residence in Waterloo in his 87th year. He had recently relocated from Oakville to Waterloo to be near his children after the death of his wife, June, in May of 2022.

In the words of a fellow Goodwill representative, Warren was "a smart, kind, generous, and unassuming man.... It was a privilege and a pleasure to chat with him at different RTOERO functions. He was a gentleman in every sense of the word. He will be missed by so many of us who enjoyed knowing him and working alongside of him".

Our Tour de France 2022 By Al Greyson

If there's an unattractive, historically insignificant town in France we have yet to find it. We have only visited a few of the "Most Beautiful Villages In France", but we think we could do our own edition based on the places we have visited. Our trip this past September with friends, Bernie and Wanda, took us mostly to new places.

We started by picking regions where we hadn't spent much time: Brittany, the Dordogne, and Occitanie. Then we picked a town or village that would make a good base from which to operate. Our first stop was Rennes in Brittany, a perfect spot for day trips to places such as Mont



St. Michel, St. Mâlo, Vitré and Châteaugiron. Rail service to the Atlantic



Coast for a day's outing was also a possibility. Wanda found a great apartment close to the historic downtown with its half-timbered buildings, Parc du Thabor, and the sumptuous market.

After five days we headed south with a first stop in Nantes. We had hoped to visit the Palais des Ducs de Brétagnes and Les Machines de L'Île, but both were closed on Mondays. Our visit became a walk along the Loire on a scorching hot day, with a brief respite at the sobering display about the role Nantes played in the African Slave Trade.

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

Our next night was in the utterly charming town of Bergerac on the Dordogne River. It would be a wonderful base for an extended visit in the future, and for any wine lovers, it is roughly equidistant to the Bordeaux and Languedoc regions. Leaving Bergerac, we followed the river east through the region known for foie gras and walnuts. The Dordogne is, in our opinion, the unheralded sibling of the Loire: very scenic, plenty of grand châteaux, great places to stay and visit and with much less traffic. We had brief stops in Rocamadour and Bozouls before our next destination, Albi.

Albi was a place we had seen on a broadcast of the Tour de France, which is as much about tourism as it is bicycle racing. The magnificent Cathedral de Sainte Cecile is apparently the largest all-brick building in the world, and the unique interior design was intriguing. The Toulouse-Lautrec Museum is next door, but we couldn't squeeze a visit in. Another overnight stay, then we were off to Carcassonne. This was my biggest disappointment of the trip. While it remains a fascinating historical structure (built by the Cathars in the 13th and 14th

We turned east and toured through some large cities before getting to our destination in Occitanie, the hilltop village of Saint-Siffret. Our villa served as a great launch pad for day trips to Nîmes, Avignon, Arles, the Camargue, Pont du

Gard and Les Bauxen-Provence. Uzès was nearby and had all the services we required plus a Haribo Candy museum and gift shop. Saint-Siffret and the many neighbouring villages are a jumble of Mediterranean-style buildings,

la-Poterie was so named for the wide selection of ceramic artists plying their trade, a great spot for authentic souvenirs and gifts.

With our trip ending, we wove our way up the Rhone Valley and through the Loire region with visits to Roanne, Bourges, Sancerre, and Briare. If you are looking for a palace with beautiful gardens and smaller crowds than Versailles, I would recommend a trip to Fontainebleau, once the home to Napoleon and Josephine.





The days of poor service and haughty attitudes are a thing of the past in France. Throughout all our visits, we have been welcomed warmly by friendly, helpful people. Hoteliers that make you feel as though you are a relative coming for a visit to the family home; restaurant staff who will do their best to help you understand the menu; people on the street hearing you speak English while looking at a map and offering to help. The only thing we might suggest is to plan your trip along rail lines. Driving in France with the speed traps, constant traffic circles, and massive speed humps has become an annoyance!

The earliest known commercial use of this c. 1872 storehouse was a confectionery (candy) shop opened by Hiram Gurley around 1880. It was called the Crawford House for Gurley's in-laws, who lived upstairs. Dahlonega's Welcome Center occupied the street front office for 25+ years. When Norman Adams purchased the aged structure, inspectors reported that the axet-hewn, heart-pine sills were still solid. Political Advocacy Committee Report By Claudia Stewart



Update on Environmental Stewardship

"Re-imagining a New Way Forward with Intention" was a Zoom presentation by RTOERO on January 31, 2023. Sheila Watt Cloutier spoke about the historic perspective of the losses of Inuit culture and the impact for climate change. Human trauma impacts climate trauma and results in planet trauma. We have to develop new

coping mechanisms and policies, and build trusting relationships to find ways to heal the planet. She suggested we try to lead with our hearts to influence rather than protest to change the leadership to develop a global impact.

Here are some additional worrisome facts about our Health Care:

1. The Ontario health system spends less per capita on health than all but one other province. We have long wait times, thousands of people with little access to primary care, too few clinical staff, and too few hospital beds because we do not invest in expanding capacity.

2. There are 1.8 million Ontarians without a doctor, and millions more who cannot access their doctor in a timely fashion and seek help from emergency rooms on an urgent basis. This is a much more expensive model of healthcare because there is no opportunity to advise patients about ways they can prevent illness.

3. Ontario pays the lowest wages and therefore, will not attract experienced nurses. There isn't excess capacity in other provinces. (The College of Nurses reported there are only 195 applicants from other provinces, 6,000 international applicants, and 4000 from Ontario). Wage-capping Bill 124 has made our province one of the least desirable places in Canada to work as a healthcare professional.

4. There has been no funding increase for home care nursing for three to four years, hence our shortage of home care nurses. Families have to hire private nursing at \$100 per hour. Insurance reimburses \$60 per hour and the rest is out-of-pocket. There are no caps on salaries in private nursing.

Foundation Report By Moira Plexman



This report highlights activities of the past year. Each initiative supports the Foundation Mission Statement: "We invest in programs, research, and training to support healthy, active aging for all Canadians. Our activities aim to improve seniors' health care, end social isolation and combat ageism."

The Fall 50-50 Draw

This was a massive success! The Foundation sold \$66,250 worth of tickets and one lucky winner took home half of this pot. The Foundation was very pleased with the success of this undertaking and may consider such events in the future if there is member interest.

Giving Tuesday

Giving Tuesday proved to be another success. Hearing Life matched all gifts up to \$5000 and then added another match of \$2500.

Grant Cycles

All proposals for Foundation grants that were submitted in the fall are reviewed by the Peer Review Panel. Final decisions will be announced in May at the RTOERO Forum. Based upon the level of response to the fall grant cycle, consideration is being given to opening up a spring grant cycle.

A Grant Success Story

Schlegel - UW Research Institute for Aging has developed a conversation guide. This is the result of a past research grant from a few years ago. The purpose of the guide is to offer a practical resource to help community members identify older adults and care partners who may be identifying barriers to participation and what to do about them, as well as conversation starters. This resource will be shared in 2023 and will be accessible on the national website.

Further Grant Updates

Nipissing University is engaged with an on-going project, "Social Connections and Living with Dementia." The aim of the study is to gain a

greater understanding of social isolation and loneliness among people living with dementia.

The University of Alberta has a research team focussing on "Mentally Healthy Living after Social Distancing." The goal is to identify mentally healthy living strategies used by older adults during the pandemic. Researchers hope to generate strategies to reduce anxiety, stress, and other mental effects of the pandemic.

In the last *Halton Herald* quite a bit of information was shared about the Chime In Program. Did any of our members give it a try? We would love to hear from you if you did!


RTOERO District 15 Halton Academic Spirit Award




