On a hot, humid and smoggy June day, eight energetic RTO members and friends landed in Beijing, a bustling, growing and clean city, not unlike any large city in North America. We toured all the major sites: Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven, Summer Palace



and Ming Tombs. We can all say "I've climbed the Great Wall". We also ex-



plored the Old City - very small houses close together separated by alleyways (Hutongs), only traversable by Rickshaw. A highlight was a typical Chinese dinner prepared by city residents and served in their own home (talk about immersing yourself in the local culture). We also enjoyed the Beijing Opera and a traditional Peking Duck dinner.

Next we were off to X'ian, home of the 'Terra Cotta Warriors;' a truly inspiring experience. A royal welcome greeted us at the ancient city gates where we were given keys to the city by the Emperor himself. Shanghai was our

next stop, a modern city only 200 years old with many different styles of western architecture. We visited the peaceful Yu Yuan Gardens considered one of China's finest We ascended the Pearl tower (Shanghai's version of the CN tower) which gave us a panoramic view of the city. 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Bartleman, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, gave a very inspiring presentation which focused on literacy programs for First Nations communities. It was approved "to expand the mandate of the Health Services and Insurance Committee to increase its governance role in order to better reflect the fiduciary responsibilities necessary to manage an \$80 million health plan and protect the interests of RTO/ERO and its members. Under its Terms of Reference, the Committee is now responsible for the oversight of the operation, administration, interpretation and application of the RTO/ERO Health Insurance Benefits Program on behalf of RTO/ERO, including plan design and premiums and it can develop and approve policies and procedures as (President's Report continues on Page 4...)

Accepting Change With Grace and Humour -A Profile of Edith Bielby (submitted by Marina Lloyd, Goodwill Chair)



Gloria Simchuk, a member of the Goodwill Committee, visited Edith Bielby in June and convinced her to share some of her life story with Halton Herald readers. At that time, Edith was preparing to move from her Poplar Drive home into a retirement facility. She didn't have to move unless she chose to. She was in good health but she felt that the time was right. As she said to Gloria, "I want to be involved as to where and when I move. If I wait too long, perhaps others will decide for me. That's not how I want to live my life."

By the middle of July, Edith had settled into a bright, two-room suite at Heritage Place where she has room for much of her own furniture and treasures and plenty of room in her mind for memories. She is enjoying piano concerts, conversations with new friends, exercise classes, delicious meals and a magnificent view of the sky from not one, but two, balconies. She expected to experience a period of mourning her losses as she'd been in her home for close to fifty years, but to her surprise, this new phase of her life has given her a sense of adventure, of beginnings rather than endings. Edith attributes her optimistic nature to her mother who always looked on the bright side of a situation and who often said that one shouldn't tell one's troubles and complaints to others, as other people had enough of their own!

Edith welcomed Gloria with enthusiasm that June day. Her sense of humour, ready wit and zest for living became contagious as she talked about her life and her passions. Edith Lott was born in Wingham, Ontario in 1910, into a large family of "long livers" known for their healthy attitudes to life and for their good genes. After a year at Toronto Normal School, she taught in a small country school near Huntsville. The school looked like a cottage with a verandah. A creek ran close by and one noon hour, the pupils decided to immerse themselves in the creek so they'd be unable to return for classes in the afternoon. But Edith had a collection of costumes for plays and instructed each pupil to select a costume to wear while the wet clothes were drying. The pupils' plans were foiled but the afternoon proved to be a lot of fun.

There was only one student in Grade 8 that first year. Edith was pleased for both of them when the girl passed her entrance exams. Many years later, that same girl phoned Edith in Burlington. Good teachers are seldom forgotten.

She met and married **Art Bielby** while teaching in Huntsville. The young couple relocated to Hamilton where Edith also taught school before moving to the house on Poplar Drive in Burlington in 1959. The Burlington teaching years were spent in Grade three classrooms in Lakeshore and Mountain Gardens Public Schools. She retired in 1974 after thirty years of teaching. As well as being a teacher, a wife, a mother, a grandmother of two and a great-grandmother of three adorable young boys, Edith spent many years in the



role of caregiver for aging and ill family members.

Edith likes to say that she has had two great loves in her life and they were both spelled Art. She comes by her creativity naturally as both her mother and her sister were artistic. She could "turn her hand" to painting, sketching, sewing, knitting, embroidery, all manner of handiwork. Several of her waterco-

lours of flowers are displayed on the walls of her new home. She studied under Burlington artist **Isobel Page** and attended summer school in Toronto at the OCA, where she was privileged to have had a class with **Arthur Lismer**. Edith Bielby, you are an inspiration to us all. May you continue in good health in order to enjoy the many adventures that still await you.




Golf Tournament

Political Action Committee By Marg Daniels



Members are reminded that there is a provincial election coming up on October 10, 2007. Later this summer I will be receiving a memo from the Provincial office with a sample list of "Election Questions" that can be used when meeting with your local candidates. If you would like a copy of those questions please contact me at margdaniels@sympatico.ca.

There was a political action insert in the summer issue of Renaissance that covered issues that the Provincial Political Action Committee has addressed this year. The topics covered include Health Care; Current Value Assessment; Sustaining Seniors' Independence and Safety; the Environment; Education; Long Term Care and Home Care; and Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs). The Fall edition of Renaissance will include a similar political action insert encouraging members to participate in the provincial election and vote. As well, a detailed explanation of the proposal suggested by the Citizen's Committee on electoral reform to change the way members are elected to Provincial Parliament in future elections will be included in this insert. As this is a complicated issue members are urged to read the explanation carefully.

Halton Herald RTO/ERO District 15 Health Services Committee



The Health Care Representative Conference was held in Toronto recently. We learned that Johnson Inc. will be providing each member of the plan a new RTO/ERO Group Benefits Program booklet for February 2008. I am convinced that our Health Services Committee is listening to the input from retired teachers and communicating with Johnson Inc.

Please be aware that you can phone World Access prior to going overseas (pre-trip assistance) to get information on currency, visas, shots and Department of External Affairs warnings or Travel Advisories for certain countries. Trip cancellation and trip interruption insurance information is in the book. These have worked well for some Halton retired teachers. I believe we have a very good contract. For this kind of travel insurance alone some people are paying more in other places. Please keep proof of out-of-country travel for each person (i.e. airplane tickets). Only a very few people request benefit entitlement review (a formal review). The new benefit entitlement review has replaced the former claims appeal for claims processed by Johnson Inc. on or after April 12, 2007.

If you retire from teaching and are covered by your spouse's slate of group benefits then decide you both want to join the RTO/ERO Johnson Inc. plan, you have 60 days to do so. If this is not done within the 60 days you will have to pass a medical test and, traditionally, 50% of people do not pass. Please deal with this in a timely fashion. If you retire from teaching to other full or part-time work, your Johnson benefits will continue. It is possible to coordinate two sets of benefits. If you have any questions or comments please phone me at 905-631-8939.

Two patients limp into two different Canadian medical clinics with the same complaint. Both have trouble walking and appear to require a hip replacement. The first patient is examined within the hour, is x-rayed the same day and has a time booked for surgery the following week.

The second sees his family doctor after waiting a week for an appointment, then waits 18 weeks to see a specialist, then gets an x-ray, which isn't reviewed for another month and finally has his surgery scheduled for a year from then.

Why the different treatment for the two patients? The first is a Golden Retriever; the second is a Senior Citizen.

Eligibility

(i) A resident Canadian Citizen or a landed immigrant.

annually each having a value \$1,000.

Application

Eligible students must complete and forward all pages of the application form by the close of business on July 16, 2008. Contact Provincial RTO/ ERO for an application or download a form from the Provincial Website.

Pension Fund Deficit

Because of the Spring Triennial review, the valuation places the deficit at \$6.5 billion, not the \$32 billion previously estimated. The deficit has been substantially reduced because of the estimated increase of 1/2 % on investments over the next three years and an increase in both active teacher and government contributions.

Pension Splitting for Seniors

Commencing 2007, pensioners over 65 are able to split income with their spouse. Couples will be able to transfer some of the highly taxed income of higher earners to the lower earning spouse, smoothing the household income and lowering the tax bite. Similarly, income derived from R.R.I.F's will be eligible for splitting with a spouse.

Let's Vote For Rather than Against (A Personal Opinion) Excerpts From an Article By Donna Reid, Member of Provincial PAC

I am tired of negative politics, votes given to political parties out of frustration and watching my friends decide their vote by who they don't want to win an election. It doesn't take a majority vote to win an election in Ontario. Most governments have been formed with less that 50% of the popular vote.

Ontario needs electoral reform to revitalize voter interest and to elect governments that represent the voters' wishes. The Citizens' Assembly, set up by Premier Dalton McGuinty, recommends that Ontario adopt a new system of a Mixed Member Proportional (MMP) that allows voter choice, fair election results and strong local representation. Voters will have two votes on the ballot. One is to select your constituency choice and the other is for the party of your choice. This allows you to vote for the person you feel best represents your interests locally as well as a second vote for the party of your choice even if the two votes represent differing parties. Voter choice means the end of strategic voting to keep out a party and the beginning of voters using a positive approach to the selection of their preferred candidates.

Elections will be fairer and will represent the wishes of the voters. The party votes will determine the proportionality of each political party in the legislature. Politicians will need to work together. Governments will be forced to negotiate to address Ontario's political issues and find solutions that many MPP's of various stripes can support. an amazing evening performance by Chinese acrobats.

Near Shanghai we toured Tongli, a small town with lots of



bridges, narrow streets, teahouses and intriguing shops. Then on to another gem, Suzhou, known as the Oriental Venice, with beautiful gardens. We were entertained with folk songs, dancing and acting and a demonstration of the ancient Chinese art of embroidery.

In Yichang we boarded a river boat for a 4 day cruise up the Yangtze River. Breathtaking views greeted us every day as we passed through five different Gorges along the river and its tributaries. Disembarking at Chongqing we visited the Dazu Rock carvings completed around 650 AD which included 50,000 Buddhist, Taoist and Confucian rock carvings. One of nature's highlights occurred when we visited the Chongqing Zoo and "ooed and awed' at the Panda Bears including an eight month old baby.



Next we flew to Guilin , a city which is encircled by over 3000 limestone hills and mountains with unusual and bizarre rock formations and caves. A cruise down the Li River brought us to Yangshuo, a small city with many interesting shops. Before leaving this picturesque city we visited a typical Chinese Tea Farm and took part in a formal Chinese Tea Ceremony.

We concluded our 20 day tour with 2 days in Hong Kong, a city with a breathtaking cityscape. Our last night included an evening harbour cruise aboard a Chinese Junk where we enjoyed a laser show using the skyscrapers as backdrops. Overall, the cities of China were very clean with lots of construction everywhere. So much so, that the local joke in China is that the national bird of China is 'the crane'. The people were warm, friendly, courteous and very helpful. All of our guides and bus drivers were fabulous. I would caution anyone travelling to China to leave their driver's license at home as they are all crazy drivers who do not believe in the rules of the road. It was a great trip which we would all highly recommend.

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Teaching in China: A Superb Way to Experience a New Culture Hal-By Cate Gnish Roberts

Sixty-three high school students in each classroom, laughing, cheering, clapping as they engage in hands-on English classes. Twenty-five women gathered around interested in seeing what 'the foreigners' were about to buy from the market – all willing to offer help and advice when we seemed perplexed. Sending e-



mails home describing the latest food that we'd been treated to by other teachers, friends, in homes and restaurants. Talking on the telephone arranging local outings with new friends whose response to our many thank you's was always, 'It is my pleasure – you are our guests." Walking at night through our small town of just under one million – to stroll amongst others gathered in public places where grandparents lovingly play with children, or wandering down to see the lights on the bridge across the Yangzte. Communicating with others with a dictionary, our Point-It picture book, the little Chinese we know and sign language. Planning a two week excursion then a month long tour of China that would take us from the east to the west in our cosy, three room dorm apartment and being interrupted by a call from the kitchen telling us that our meal was ready or a knock on the door from students anxious to practise their English. Repeating Chinese after our mentor, Mr. Liu, a teacher and Cultural Revolution survivor. Preparing lessons for teachers eager to learn new techniques and learn about different pedagogical methods. These are some



of the vivid memories I have of five months spent in China. My husband Peter and I thrived as volunteer English Language teachers in Jingjiang City, Jiangsu Province - two hours from Shanghai. I was at the prestigious Jingjiang High School and Peter, 37 years out of the classroom, was in the elementary For-

eign Language School. Both are modern complexes, with all the amenities needed to house 7,000 students! We had western schedules – easy compared to the 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. ones worked by Chinese teachers.

To acclimatise to our new culture, we celebrated the Chinese New Year for three weeks in February on the southern island of Hainan. To celebrate the end of our teaching stint, we spent a month seeing the tourist hot spots all the way to Tibet and back. And everywhere we went, we celebrated the friendliness,



affability, warmth and generosity of the Chinese people - many who will

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remain friends for life! China is a great country with fabulous scenery, wonderful food, marvellous arts and culture, welcoming people and a very positive attitude to the future. It is moving quickly into the 21st century and changes are coming at a fast pace. We would heartily recommend a visit to China and would love to go back ourselves. We miss it already. We hope our pictures let you share some of our feelings.
