

Health Briefs

- Good social network thwarts dementia in elderly. Socializing with friends and family improves cognition and possibly prevents dementia, according to a five-year study that tracked 2,200 elderly women, all initially dementia-free. Of the 456 with low "socialnetwork" scores, 18 per cent developed dementia over the study. Of the 1,793 women with stronger social networks, 10 per cent developed dementia.
- *Memory loss in seniors linked to diet.* Dwindling memory in seniors is associated with a high saturated fat and cholesterol diet, according to a University of South Carolina study. As humans age, memory might be preserved, and brain functions improved by restricting the consumption of cholesterol and saturated fats, researchers say.
- Vitamin D prolongs colon cancer survival. Patients diagnosed with colon cancer but with high vitamin D levels were less likely to die than those deficient in the vitamin, according to a joint Harvard and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute study in the Journal of Clinical Oncology. Previous research had shown that higher levels of vitamin D reduce the risk for colon and rectal cancer by about 50 per cent, but its effect on outcomes wasn't known until this study.

Many of you will remember Jack as an elementary school teacher, Vice-Principal and Principal most recently in Glenview and Tecumseh Public Schools. He included this picture in uniform taken in the summer of 1941. What a great portrait! Here is an excerpt of what Jack wrote:

"Following six years in the RCAF during World War Two I had to decide what I was going to do with the



rest of my life. I decided to become a teacher, a decision I never regretted. While a teacher, I was able to enjoy my love of flying. I joined a glider club and learned to fly gliders and then became an instructor. When I retired I did volunteering for the Red Cross and the Childrens' Aid...served on the Board of Directors for Carrie House under the excellent leadership of Len Kay, (became) a driving instructor and taught driver education in several schools in the area.

Because of my involvement in gliders, I was asked by the Air Cadets to train their glider pilots to become instructors. I did this for many years both as

an instructor and tow pilot (and) continued to fly for the Air Cadets until I was 80 years of age. This past February my pilot's medical expired and at 89 years of age I decided not to renew it. This June, Joan and I (celebrated) 66 happy years of marriage. We have three children, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. I am a very lucky person as I have enjoyed a long and healthy life."

Lillian has two great-grandsons. Each member of her family is so precious to her - and all are so good to her. She is also grateful for her faith community at East Plains United Church where she taught Sunday School, was instrumental in beginning the very successful Artisans' Show which continues to this day, initiated a Senior Bible Class and began the marathon bridge group. She confesses to being a bridge addict which partly explains why her mind is so keen. Watching Jeopardy and American and Canadian political programs on television must also contribute to furnishing that active mind. Her curiosity about the wider world led to several memorable trips - to Europe where Rome's Vatican museum enthralled her and to Israel where biblical history came to life. It is her openness to considering new knowledge and new ideas that impressed me greatly. She belongs to a Seekers Group at East Plains. The members of

this group strive to acquaint themselves with modern biblical scholarship, struggle with important life questions and, where answers to the questions cannot be found, celebrate

the mysteries. Authors she finds helpful as she reflects upon issues of faith include John Shelby Spong, Karen Armstrong and Marcus Borg.

When I asked Lillian about the quality she prized most highly in others and herself, she immediately answered, "Honesty". She has been known to be too honest, if that's possible. Bill would often say to her, "Lillian, did you have to say that?" and she was warned by her father, "Your tongue will hang you one day." But, isn't it refreshing to meet someone who has the courage to say what she thinks? In the photo On Page 2, which accompanies Lillian's story and which was taken on the occasion of her 90th birthday, you can see, in that smile, a zest for life, a vibrancy which has not diminished over the years. Just another quality of spirit that each of us can learn FROM Lillian McLean.

A Kindergarten teacher was observing her classroom of children while they were drawing. She would occasionally walk around to see each child's work.

As she got to one little girl who was working diligently, she asked what the drawing was.

The girl replied, 'I'm drawing God.'

For her labours that first year, she earned the princely sum of \$400. She received a raise the following year and her salary stayed at \$425 until September of 1939 when she moved to Waterdown Public School to teach Grades Three and Four where 'baby' sister Ann was one of her pupils. While we're on the subject of teachers' salaries, it's interesting to note that in 1972, when Lillian had been teaching Family Studies for 5 years at Burlington Central, she was earning \$11,000!

In 1941, she married Bill Emery. Bill was managing his father's market garden in Aldershot and the couple's first home was the upstairs of a house on the North Shore at King Road. The house belonged to the Filman family and was known as Willowbank. Eventually they moved to the Emery home farm across from St. Matthew's Anglican Church on Plains Road. Longos bought the land in the 70's. Bill and Lillian had two daughters - Brenda and Janice. Lillian was a role model for her "girls" as both became teachers in Halton. In fact, she was the first woman in the area to continue to teach after marrying. Each time she planned to retire, another opportunity was presented to her. When Brenda was ready for Kindergarten, she was asked to teach for a halfday in Waterdown. She spent a year at Maplehurst when Brenda and Janice were there and then came the dream of a job when Principal Norm Dalgleish asked her to set up the Home Economics room at Glenview. Students from four area schools came to Glenview for her classes in all aspects of home management - sewing, cooking and entertaining. Each Spring, in each of the area schools, her students presented a fashion show wearing their own creations. All the while, she was attending university classes extramurally until she completed a BA in Religion and Sociology.

In 1961, when Brenda and Janice were still teenagers, her husband Bill died. Lillian married Jim McLean in 1972, and they were privileged to spend four years together before Jim's death in 1976.

Learning FROM Lillian:

Now that you know a bit ABOUT Lillian McLean, I want to share some of the valuable things I gleaned FROM getting to know her better - attitudes of mind and qualities of spirit that we would all be wise to emulate. Although she's suffered her share of losses, still she maintains an attitude of gratitude, particularly for her family which includes two stepchildren - Janice McLean Rowe and Rob McLean as well as daughters, Brenda and Janice. Lelia Lindsay - 105 Years of Age and Still Going Strong! By Warren McBurney (Goodwill West Area Convenor)

You have heard of the good old days in the early 1900s from your grandparents. But what if you actually lived through them, and started school yourself a hundred years ago? This is the claim that Lelia Lindsay can make at age 105! Growing up near Welland, Lelia took her teacher training in Hamilton, and spent her teaching life with kindergarteners. She refers to the fun of being with them when they were "too young to know enough to come in out of the rain" still needing help with their boots and coats, and therefore very lovable. She could even hug them in those days.

Now a resident at Wyndham Lodge in Oakville, Lelia's remembrances of her classroom days are rather sketchy. She does, however, have a granddaughter, **Brenda Spaulding**, and several other relatives who were able to fill in a few details about their long-living ancestor. Her musical ability stood her in

good stead with her young students. She could play the piano by ear, and we can just imagine her little ones breaking out into song when they needed a change of pace. She was a big user of existing items

She wore custom tailored clothing - always perfectly fitting and flattering.

rather than buying a lot of play equipment for her students. They benefited too from her having co-written several books on teaching mathematics.

Relations remember Lelia as wearing custom tailored clothing - always perfectly fitting and flattering. A devout member of St. John's United Church in Oakville, she still has a strong faith. At night she hopes the Lord will take her, and in the morning she thanks Him for keeping her going. Her church friends are still faithful in visiting her at Wyndham.

In Oakville Lelia taught at Old Central School. After her retirement, she continued to enjoy her cottage near Bobcaygeon where she had a collection of driftwood that she found and finished for her rustic decor. She was always very careful about the appearance of her home, and in January, 1949, a picture of her living room appeared on the cover of *Your Garden and Home*. She was never a gardener, but enjoyed curling and golf - she even played with Marlene Stewart Streit! - and still lives outside vicariously with Tiger Woods and his golf. She played duplicate bridge until she was 92, and continued having teas for her bridge-playing friends.

Long-Term Care and Your Independence

The RTO/ERO Long Term Care Plan offers three different levels of daily benefit and lifetime maximums - \$50/day to \$50,000/lifetime, \$75/day to \$100,000/lifetime, and \$100/day to \$200,000/lifetime. You choose the coverage level you need.

What is a Care Coordinator?

Members and their families have their own Care Coordinator - your patient advocate. They will assess your needs, develop a plan of care to access benefits under your RTO/ERO Plan, and provide you with information about community resources and providers. The Care Coordinator will work with you and your family to ensure that as your needs change over time your plan of care is adjusted to meet your evolving needs.

Who is Eligible for Long Term Care Insurance?

As a member of RTO/ERO, you and your family members (spouse, adult children, and parents) ages 18 to 89 can apply. Persons applying for coverage must complete an application that includes questions about health. For more information, contact Johnson Inc. at 1-877-LTC-PLAN (1-877-582-7526).



Learning ABOUT Lillian - Learning FROM Lillian By Marina Lloyd (Goodwill Chair)

To learn ABOUT Lillian McLean, it's best to begin at the beginning. It was April 14, 1915, on a farm on Snake Road in Waterdown, when Winnifred and Charles Rankin welcomed the second of their eight children, Lillian May. Right next door, on land which now belongs to Notre Dame Convent, lay Lillian's grandparents' farm and in your mind's eye, you can see her skipping through the fields between the two farms, barefoot in summer, or dressed in her Sunday best on her way to Sunday School at the Methodist church in Waterdown. Childhood memories are bathed in golden light. On hot summer days, the children cooled off with a swim in Grindstone Creek which ran along the back of the farm, but by the time they walked home, they were as hot as before.

Their friends loved to play at the Rankin farm as there were swings and even a tennis court. The land was used for market gardening so there was always work before and after school, picking and sorting vegetables and cutting the asparagus. The produce was taken to the Guelph market first by horse and wagon and later by truck, although Lillian remembers riding in a surrey before her father owned a car or a truck. In 1921, she entered the Junior First class at Mary Hopkins School where Mr. Riddell was both teacher and principal. He was a forward-thinking educator who introduced Household Science into the curriculum and hired a Music Supervisor to visit the school regularly. Always an honour student, Lillian skipped a grade, entering Waterdown High School the year it was opened. After Grade 13, she trained to be a teacher at Hamilton Normal School but teaching jobs were scarce as hens' teeth, so she stayed at home for a year looking after her baby sister Ann, who is well known to many Halton teachers as **Ann Robbins**.

When she did "land" a job it was a big one! She was responsible for 55 children from Grades One to Five in Flamborough Centre Continuation School. So young and so many pupils and yet there were no discipline problems even when the principal was away and she was in charge of the whole school. Memories from that first job, include driving to school in winter when the road was tunneled out of a snowbank, getting stuck and struggling the rest of the way through snow that came up to her armpits. To get a permanent certificate in the 30's, you needed to obtain five university courses within five years. Her interest in Home Economics had already been sparked in public school so she included summer school courses in Family Studies as well.

Health Services Committee

A conference was held in Toronto in June for all District Health Services representatives. Here are some of the items that were discussed:

- World Access has changed it's name to Mondial Assistance. You can call them prior to travelling for information on shots needed, doctors and hospitalization for the area you are going to.
- Remember to get receipts for health services rendered. Any additional bills coming to you after coming home go directly to Mondial Assistance.
- Carry your RTO/ERO card with you when travelling. It has the toll free direct phone number to the office in Waterloo.
- People who are switching health plans and wish to join the RTO/ERO Health Benefit Plan should remember that this must be done within 60 days of leaving the former plan in order to avoid having to take a medical.
- Please be advised that if your permanent residence is outside of Canada, your RTO/ERO Health Plan is not in effect.
- Trip cancellation insurance provided by your plan has certain deadlines. You must notify Waterloo within 48 hours of your medical emergency.
- Be sure to use the latest 2008 Health Benefit Plan booklets when checking for the rules. The 2005 booklet is no longer in effect and must be discarded.

Travel coverage beyond 62 days now available!

- As of September 1, 2008, people travelling outside of Canada may now purchase extended health coverage beyond the 62 day coverage period. These are offered in 5 day increments at a rate of \$65 for a single person.
- Remember, just because you are a member of RTO/ERO this does not mean that you are automatically a member of the health plan. You must apply for this coverage.



Provincial RTO/ERO is encouraging all District Political Action Committees to monitor the Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs). In our case, this means monitoring two separate networks - Hamilton Niagara Haldimand Brant, which includes Burlington and Mississauga; Halton, which includes Oakville, Milton and Halton Hills. Monitoring both of these will take quite a few interested members in order to fulfill the task efficiently.

The decisions these bodies make are very important. Consider the case in Hamilton of the VON and Hamilton Home Care, whose staff came close to losing their jobs caring for patients at home, because of the LHIN's decision to use a bidding process to contract for services, which took no notice of past performance. Patients and the public were outraged and by vehemently protesting forced the McGuinty Government to step in to change the process. Even if you are not interested in other areas of political action, keeping track of what an appointed government body is planning for our local health care may pique your interest. HDSB Retirees Can Now CHATT Friends

The Halton District School Board will be piloting an HDSB Retirees' Conference on their CHATT system this month in partnership with the Halton Learning Foundation, the charitable arm of the Board.

HDSB retirees will be able to contact all staff currently on the wider CHATT conference in addition to having access to the Staff Room Conference which offers sub-conferences dealing with buy/sell/trade, births, retirements, bereavements, book club, film and TV club, and staff matters. Additional retirees' conferences will be established as the project unfolds. Retirees will also have access to the CHATT Help Conference. As well, a group of knowledgeable volunteers including retired staff have been recruited to provide more personal support to members on an "as needed" basis.

The membership fee is a \$50 annual contribution to the Halton Learning Foundation. A \$35 tax receipt will be provided to the member. This initiative is available solely to Halton District School Board retirees.

The Halton Learning Foundation was established six years ago to raise money and resources to support programs and projects not normally funded by the Ministry. A more recent addition and focus has been the Barriers Fund, which has been created to support individual students whose learning opportunities have been disadvantaged by their family's financial situation. Over 10% of Halton students live below the poverty line.

Pension Committee

Ontario Teachers Pension Plan Update

Assets: end of 2007 Total: \$108.5 billion; a \$2.9 billion increase

Positives

The annual return was 4.5%, beating the composite benchmark of 2.3% despite the huge hit in public equities (stocks). Private equity (investments directly in businesses) increased from \$7.3 billion to \$9 billion, a 9.8% rate of return.

Challenges

Payments to retirees is now double the contributions by active teachers and government. There is an actuarial deficit of \$12.7 billion (shortfall between the plan's assets and liabilities).

Strategies

- 1. Reduction in public equities to 45% US; at one time it was 60%. This takes some of the risk out of portfolios and reduces volatility.
- 2. The funds are being placed into more sensitive areas such as real estate, commodities, infrastructure and timberlands.
- 3. Investing in so-called emerging markets such as China, Brazil and Chile is on the increase.

Conclusions

- 1. The fund is being managed in a successful, professional manner.
- 2. Our pensions are guaranteed by the Pension Benefits Act 1997. We nevertheless should all be concerned about the challenges facing the pension fund.
