Halton Herald Nordic Pole Walking By Jan Murdoch



I was so pleased to have such a large group of people join me at Tansley Woods in May to learn about Nordixx Pole Walking. After learning about all the physical benefits of doing this activity from Dr Klaus Schwanbeck, the president of Nordixx Canada, we joined several instructors to learn first hand the techniques behind good pole walking. In our small groups we ventured off through the parking lot, poles in hand, pressing more

confidently into the ground and standing taller. Some were able to maintain a quick pace while others concentrated on pole placement.

I recently became aware of the fitness apostle Jack Lalanne who inspired billions to live active lives. Jack once said "The only way you can hurt your body is not to use it, inactivity is the killer and it's never too late." He preached the benefits of regular exercise and exemplified his theories with many feats of endurance. At age 65 Jack swam the length of the Golden Gate bridge underwater, handcuffed and shackled



towing a 1,000 lb. boat. And at 65 he towed 65 boats in a lake near Tokyo, Japan handcuffed and shackled plus the boats were filled with 6500 lbs. of Louisiana Pacific wood pulp. Jack died at the age of 96 but he was active right to the end.

Another person who champions the benefits of exercise throughout our years is Harvey Brooker. He once said "We all grow older but it is truly up to us as individuals if we choose to get old! If we want our later life years to be fulfilling we need to eat properly, watch our weight, exercise and keep our mind active." Those who have continued to walk with their poles on a regular basis will definitely be experiencing the benefits of the program. Many of us continue to meet at Tansley Woods Wednesday mornings, to encourage each other and offer suggestions for stretching techniques following our 1 hour stroll. A few of us are going to venture to Europe in early April, 2012 and combine Nordixx Pole walking with a River Cruise on the Mosel and Rhine. Others are exploring scenic areas near water ways or in quaint villages. If you have found locations for walking send me an e-mail

After a decade spent as a teacher and principal at both the elementary and secondary levels, he served as Superintendent in Peel, Halton and Grey county. He also worked with educational systems in the Eastern Caribbean States, Barbados, Guyana, Jamaica, Uganda, the UK and West Germany. He was appointed Governor of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education from 1988-1990. After retirement his tireless work included the Burlington

Inclusivity Advisory Committee, the Rambo Creek Ratepayers Association and co-chair of the Mayor's Citizen's Advisory Committee which produced the Shape Burlington report. He continued to dedicate his time to a long list of other community organizations. Politically John was president of the Burlington Provincial Liberal Association for six years. After his death the Burlington Post issued condolences expressed by Ted McMeeken MPP and Premier Dalton McGinty who between them stated that as an intelligent and compassionate community- builder John has left an indelible mark on his community. In May John was officially named Burlington's Citizen of the Year. This award recognizes an individual who makes an exemplary contribution to the city of Burlington. As well, the legacy of John will live on in the name of Burlington's newest school. The Halton District School Board has named the new Orchard elementary school the John William Boich Public School. Walter Mulkewich a former mayor of Burlington summed up his attributes fittingly when he stated that John was a person who has demonstrated the art of citizenship at its best.

The Health Care Representatives Conference was held in Toronto recently and some interesting discussions occurred among the very knowledgeable retired teachers in attendance. Dr. Ian Blumer, a diabetes MD specialist, was the Sunday night speaker. In his talk he made a clear relationship between obesity and Type 2 diabetes which I found disturbing. He said that if Mr. Obama

can set aside 40 minutes a day out of his busy schedule for exercise you can too. He has written several books and has a web-site (www.ourdiabetes.com) that you can view if you are interested in finding out more on the topic.

Osteoporosis Canada recommends that everyone over 65 years of age get a Bone Mineral Density Test. And, all those 50 years of age and older should talk to a doctor about a risk assessment for fracture. The 90 day exclusion for heart disease, lung disease and cancer when travelling came up again at the conference as it relates to the Extended Health Travel Insurance. Pension and Retirement Concerns Committee By Jim Baker



Recent articles from the Teachers Pension Plan endorsed by OTF and the Ontario Government stress the dilemma facing our pension plan. Most pension plans are facing the same problems. Our plan has a \$17.2 billion shortfall that must be resolved.

Reasons for the Pension Difficulties

1. Pension payments now considerably exceed annual contributions. There are now more retirees than active teachers. The life expectancy of the 295,000 teachers, both active and retired, has increased probably affected by the earlier retirement age of approximately 59.

2. Most countries, including Canada, are still grappling with an economic downturn. Much of our plan is dealing with a low interest rate of approximately 1%. Although our fund grew by 13% in 2010, it is still insufficient to offset our substantial funding deficit.

Steps Being Taken to Deal With the Deficit

1. Inflation protection

a. If you retired before 2010 you will continue to receive 100% inflation protection each year.

b. If you retired after 2009 you will receive 60% of the annual cost of living increase on the portion of your pension credit earned after 2009. Increases for the portion of your pension credit earned before 2010 will continue to match 100% of the annual change in the cost of living.

2 Active teachers will face a 1.1% salary reduction phased in over 3 years by 2014. This is the equivalent of \$880 a year on a salary of \$80,000. Earlier increases in payroll reductions will be permanent. Contributions on additional income will rise to 13.1% compared with a top contribution rate of 8.9% in 2005.




Portrait of a Gentleman By Marina Lloyd - Chair of Goodwill Committee



One a sunny June day, I left **Don Gentleman**'s home, my arms laden with four books filled with fifty-eight years of memories from his boyhood to retirement from the Halton District School Board. Each book is titled *In My Mind's Eye* and the preface to Book One includes the following quote from the Roman poet Martial... "It is to live twice, when we can enjoy the recollections of our former life."

Not only is Don's memory for people, places and events prodigious, but he also is able to recall sounds, smells, tastes and colours, a gift he attributes to his father, who, as they walked together, would draw his son's attention to the beauty of his surroundings. Don was born in 1923 in the village of Melbourne, west of London, where his father ran a general store and post office. Many of his depictions of village and rural life in the 30's will resonate with readers of a certain age - party lines which provided gossip for the neighbours, Sunday night radio programs such as *Fibber McGee and Molly*, oyster suppers, garden parties, threshers going from farm to



farm (and being well fed by the farmers' wives), barn raisings and Fall Fairs.

And the fires! Five fires in seven years - his father's store falling victim to the 1933 blaze. Details of events in the world outside the village are sprinkled throughoutthe death of a king, the abdication of a king, the coronation of his brother, the explosion of the dirigible Hindenburg, and the ominous news from Europe as Hitler invades Austria and Chamberlain returns talking of appeasement. War with Germany was declared in September 1939, the year that Don entered Grade 13. His memoir continues to be dotted with news of the fall of France, fighting in the desert, on the Russian front and in the Pacific.

In September of 1942, Don registered in a Science course at Western University. All male students were assigned to the Officer Training Corps. They wore army uniforms to class three days a week and reported for training from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. In his third year, Don switched to the University Naval Training Divi-(Don Gentleman... continues on Page 25)

sion and spent three weeks training at HMCS Cornwallis in Nova Scotia. He found himself increasingly fascinated with the Geology lectures and labs, so in his third year, he applied to the Government of Canada Geological survey for summer employment and was assigned to Flin Flon and Lake Wekusko in Northern Manitoba. He spent the following summer in Goldfields on Lake Athabaska in Saskatchewan. The summer of 1947 found him in the Sudbury area working for INCO searching for nickel ore with a magnetometer. He seriously considered spending his life examining rocks as a geologist, but the prospect of introducing young people to the beauty of the Sciences was irresistible and so he entered OCE in the Science Specialist course. On Labour Day, 1948, he stepped off the Greyhound bus in Campbellford. Not only did he meet his first students the next day, he was introduced to "the girl in the green dress," another new staff member named Doreen. Little did he know then, that he was meeting the love of his life, the woman who has been his partner for sixty-one years.

In September of 1954, Don joined the staff of Burlington - Nelson District High School (eventually to be known as Central H.S.) and the third edition of *In My Mind's Eye* describes in great detail the next fifteen years at that school. Mr. J.M. Bates was his principal - there were 865 students and 31 staff members. As well as teaching Physics, Chemistry and Science, Don coached football, worked with the Cadet Corps and chaired the salary committee. He had a heart for all his students but, remembering with regret his own poor study habits, he took a particular interest in those who were experiencing difficulty and was determined to help them reach their potential.

When the school went on a six-day cycle, time tabling for the now over 1000 students was done on sheets of plywood with nails on which were hung coloured tags. Events in the outside world were still being faithfully recorded. When Mr. Bates retired in 1963 after 35 years of principalship, Emerson Lavender was appointed to take his place. Don remembers that November day when Emerson announced the death of President Kennedy to the students by reading the passage from Shakespeare's Julius Caesar which begins, "This was the noblest Roman of them all." Four years later, Don would be occupying the principal's office. His successful implementation of a credit system, the first composite school in Ontario to do so, is a source of pride. The fourth book of his memoirs details his work as an Assistant and Area Superintendent with the Halton Board from 1969 until he retired in 1981. He was first assigned to the West Education Area with responsibility for supervision and evaluations, capital budgets, enrolment

projections, staffing, meeting with consultants and construction of new schools. Once he was even called from his office to herd cattle that had escaped from an overturned truck. He later moved to the North Education Area which had its own unique challenges, particularly the distances between schools and the need to decide when to close schools because of inclement weather. In recognition of his considerable contributions to education in Burlington, he was honoured to receive a Centennial medal.

Throughout his career, Doreen was a source of strength, providing a home that was a haven at the end of each exhausting day. For ten years following retirement from the Board, he served the public in a different fashion, selling clothing in the menswear department of Scriveners. Nowadays he is afforded the luxury of time - time to revel in the accomplishments of his three daughters and two grandchildren; time to indulge in his hobbies - photography, stamp collecting, writing, listening to music and tending his perennial garden. When I mentioned Don's name to former colleagues, I heard words such as "a fine man"; "a dedicated teacher"; "an able administrator"; but the response most often heard, spoke of how the name described the man, for he is both a gentleman and a gentle man.

As the Roman poet wrote, recollecting the past allows a person to live twice. Don has been privileged to have remembered so much from his past and to have so faithfully recorded his observations in the books. This is a gift to anyone who, like myself, has the good fortune to read them. We look forward to reading an account of his post-retirement years in the fifth edition of *In My Mind's Eye!*

Aldershot School Celebrates 50 years By Leanne Taylor



Aldershot School reaches a milestone this fall when staff and students along with alumni and former staff celebrate the 50th anniversary of its opening. The high school opened in 1961 in time for the first influx of baby boomers reaching adolescence. Just as the children of that era have experienced many changes, so too has the school. Over the years, there have been several additions and modifications that have enabled the school to become one of the top schools in Ontario. In 2008, it was ranked as 12th in Ontario by the Fraser Institute in terms of Literacy and Math Scores. Not bad for the school with the smallest secondary enrolment in Halton!

Aldershot H.S. opened as a 9-13 school, drawing students from the Aldershot area who had previously attended Waterdown S.S. Additions saw the building of technical shops, a gymnasium and cafeteria and a new office wing. By 1973 there were over 1200 students. Changing demographics and the elimination of OAC threatened the school with closure at the end of the '90's. To prevent this, grades 7 and 8 were added, creating a school with two panels. New science labs were installed, the machine shop was converted to two music rooms, and other interior changes were made to accommodate the new format. Adjustments take time, but over the years, Aldershot School has become a cohesive entity, continuing to do well in provincial testing, achieving gold standard in the music program and offering extensive opportunities for team sports. The fondness former students hold for Aldershot can be seen in the number of alumni who come back to teach – at one point in recent years, the Leadership Team had four former students holding headships.

In 2001, a fortieth anniversary celebration was held, raising a considerable sum which has been used for scholarships for graduating students over the last ten years. The 50th Celebration has a similar goal. A staff reception with a light meal will be held from 4-6 p.m. for staff – previous and present – before the official opening at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, October 7. Everyone is welcome to attend. Cruising and Touring French Polynesia By Laura Bird and Leo McAdam

Beautiful, stunning, magnificent, spectacular -Tahiti is truly picture-postcard perfect and definitely worth the 13 hours of air travel. Papeete is a friendly, bustling town with a wonderful market filled with Polynesian products - colourful clothing, arts, crafts, and jewellry with an emphasis on black pearls. Vendors readily give prices in both U.S. Dollars and French Polynesian francs. No pushy hucksters here or on any other island. The Papenoo Valley in the heart of Tahiti teems with graceful waterfalls and lush tropical forests. A brief heavy rainfall increased the waterfalls ten-



fold. An unexpected

surprise. The deluge brought down trees blocking our return route but clearing the road with the locals was fun. For history buffs, there are monuments for Captains Cook and Bligh both of whom were important visitors to Tahiti. There is also the Gauguin Museum and of course, "Mutiny On The Bounty" was immortalized here.

The Society Islands around Tahiti are only a short ferry boat ride from each other and we enjoyed the leisurely and scenic pace of the 10 day cruise. At each port island, there were many opportunities to drive through the lush tropical landscape or visit ancient ruins of Tiki gods. After strolling around each island town, we often took short outrigger rides to offshore smaller islands, called motus, to visit a pearl farm, swim or snorkel in the warm, calm jewel-like lagoons. As for snorkeling, we had "done" the Great Barrier Reef and thought that we would be disappointed here but each island is inside a coral reef so underwa-

ter activites were fabulous at every stop. It was not uncommon to be up close and personal with the stingrays and black fin sharks.

Huahine, known as the garden island, has a slow-paced life in stark contrast to the hustle and bustle of Papeete. It is small enough to walk from one side to the other and enjoy the long white beaches. Opportunities to visit vanilla plantations are available on this island and others. Rangiroa has built a reputation on diving and snorkeling excursions along with fishing and pearl production. Its enormous lagoon could contain the whole island of Tahiti.



With any snorkeling excursion, in French Polynesia, it is a good idea to take your own gear since what is provided is not sanitized between users.




To the Polynesians, Raiatea is considered the most sacred of all the Society Islands - home of their god of war and fertility with legends of human sacrifice. This was an important island for tribal meetings and ceremonies. In the same lagoon lies the little island of Tahaa where we visited a small family owned pearl farm. Learning about the colours, texture and grades of pearls

is a must if you intend to purchase Tahitian pearls. Many of the outdoor vendors on each island have inexpensive, low grade pearls while the farms and jewellery

stores sell the high end products. Back on board the ship, we were treated to dances by the children of Raiatea while being informed about local folklore.

While Bora Bora is the most renowned, it is also over-rated and overpriced. So, many of the resorts have closed down. Empty thatched cottages on stilts line the coast. We were told that \$500





a night was not uncommon for a stay. However, there are some interesting op-



portunities here. A well-known drinking hole is "Bloody Mary's" with its sand floors (check your flip flops at the door) and wooden billboards listing the hundreds of famous people who have stopped by for the signature drink (John Denver, Carlos Delgado, Cameron Diaz, Meg Ryan, Rich Little to name a few) - a favourite stop of Leo's.

I enjoyed learning the art of pareo dyeing and the various methods of tying them. Best of all was the helmet dive. Ten feet down on the sand with our oxygen helmets, we were swarmed by many colourful fish. I could have done without the nip from the stingray, though! Crabs are the bane of flower gardens here. Throw an hibiscus near a crab hole and watch the little creatures emerge and drag the flower back into their hidey hole for a munch.

Moorea, with Tahiti, from the air, appears to be a beautiful green butterfly floating on a tranquil blue sea. It is an uncrowded tropical island of dramatically jagged mountains, lush forests, turquoise lagoons and white sand beaches. Among

the cruisers, it was the island of choice for a weeklong stay. It is no wonder that the Bali Hai parts of "South Pacific" were filmed here. Because there are so many places to see in the world, we have always said we would only visit a place once, but this Jewel in the ocean is definitely a piece of heaven we would consider touring again.


